




LWCF Funding Flow










<u>LWCF</u> <u>Submission</u> <u>Timeline</u>

Application documentation may be submitted at any time. However, be aware of absolute deadlines if your project includes matching funds with timeline constraints.

2023 Funding Cycle

January 2023	Announcement	The North Carolina Division of Parks and Recreation (DPR) informs local governments about the availability of LWCF matching grants and how to apply. Electronic copies of the application are available on the website.
January 17, 2023	Information webinar	DPR provides applicant training through Microsoft Teams.
February 17, 2023	Application review deadline for Round 2	Local governments may submit their draft applications to their RRS regional consultant for a technical review to ensure that the application is complete.
March 17, 2023	Application deadline for Round 2	Applicants must submit their application through their assigned SharePoint portal by 5 p.m. Late or incomplete submissions may be delayed until a subsequent funding round.





Eligibility



- LWCF dollar-for-dollar matching grants to local governments for the acquisition and/or development.
- A local government can request a maximum of \$500,000 with each application.
- North Carolina counties and incorporated municipalities are eligible for LWCF grants.
 Federally recognized Native American tribes are also eligible.
- LWCF grants can be used to acquire land for a public park; to develop outdoor recreation and support facilities; or a combination of both. A project must be located on a single site.
- LWCF funded projects are reserved for public outdoor recreation in perpetuity (54 U.S.C. § 200305(f)(3)).

Matching Funds

- An applicant must match the grant with a minimum of 50%. Due to a federal share cap of \$500,000, a greater match is required for projects that exceed total costs of \$1 million
- Matching funds can be cash-on-hand, private donation, bonds, and other state or local grants as allowed by the grantor
- Matching funds cannot be other federal funds with the exception of
 - Community Development Grants
 - Safe, Accountable, Flexible, Efficient Transportation Equity Act
 - Fixing America's Surface Transportation Act
- LWCF funding cannot be used to match other federal funding opportunities
